Definitions

- Proverb:
 - A wise saying
 - Sentences of ethical wisdom (Strong's)
- Wisdom:
 - Applied knowledge (using facts and knowledge)
 - Presents general truths

Solomon's Contradiction?

- [Pro 4:7 NKJV] 7 Wisdom [is] the principal thing; [Therefore] get wisdom. And in all your getting, get understanding.
- [Ecc 1:17-18 NKJV] 17 And I set my heart to know wisdom and to know madness and folly. I perceived that this also is grasping for the wind. 18 For in much wisdom [is] much grief, And he who increases knowledge increases sorrow.

Solomon's Contradiction?

• [Ecc 2:12-16 NKJV] 12 Then I turned myself to consider wisdom and madness and folly; For what [can] the man [do] who succeeds the king?--[Only] what he has already done. 13 Then I saw that wisdom excels folly As light excels darkness. 14 The wise man's eyes [are] in his head, But the fool walks in darkness. Yet I myself perceived That the same event happens to them all. 15 So I said in my heart, "As it happens to the fool, It also happens to me, And why was I then more wise?" Then I said in my heart, "This also [is] vanity." 16 For [there is] no more remembrance of the wise than of the fool forever, Since all that now [is] will be forgotten in the days to come. And how does a wise [man] die? As the fool!

What Kind Of Wisdom?

(1 Cor. 1:17,19-21)

- Proverbs Pursuit of godly wisdom
 - Fear God
 - Righteousness
- Ecclesiastes Life "under the sun"
 - Frustration of pursuing worldly wisdom
 - Recognition of injustice and suffering
- Proverbs takes the larger perspective.

Purposes/Uses Of The Book (Prov. 1:1-6)

- Know wisdom and instruction (v. 2)
- Perceive the words of understanding (v. 2)
- Receive instruction in wise behavior (NASB), justice, judgment and equity (v. 3)
- Give prudence to the simple, to the young man knowledge and discretion (v. 4)

Purposes/Uses Of The Book (Prov. 1:1-6)

- Wise men can increase in learning (v. 5)
- Understand a proverb and an enigma, the words of the wise and their riddles (v. 6)

The Beginning Of Wisdom

- The fear of the Lord (v. 7)
 - Includes genuine fear
 - Honor, respect
 - The fool has neither
