Morgan asserted both the Bible and the U.S. Constitution were "inherently flawed" and needed new "amendments". "Both the Bible and the Constitution were well intentioned but they are basically, inherently flawed. Hence, the need to amend it. My point to you about gay rights, for example, [is that] it's time for an amendment to the Bible. You should compile a new Bible."

- Many are in acceptance of his views: (their numbers are growing!)
 - Political progressives view the Constitution as a "living document".
 - Subject to the whims of each generation.
 - Religious liberals view the Scriptures in the same way.

- Mr. Morgan's statement is more honest than some of his cohorts.
 - He acknowledges the Bible, as it's written, does not endorse gay marriages.
 - In the same way, his comments about the Constitution acknowledges the current efforts to deny law-abiding citizens the right to bear arms is a violation of the Second Amendment.
 - Thus Mr. Morgan believes both the Bible and the Constitution need to be amended, so they will conform to the present day mindset.

Is truth defined by each and every individual?
Does it make any difference what we believe and practice?

PLURALISM: TOLERANCE OF ALL BELIEFS

What Is Pluralism?

- "Theory that there are more than one or more than two kinds of ultimate reality" (Webster).
- "A theory or system that recognizes more than one ultimate principle" (**Oxford**).
- As citizens of the U.S. we live in a nation where different ethnic, racial, religious, and social groups exists.
- While we enjoy freedom of religious thought and expression, this does not mean that all are equally valid, at least in the sight of God and according to the standard of His Divine revelation.

PLURALISM: TOLERANCE OF ALL BELIEFS

What Is Meant By Tolerance?

- "Sympathy or indulgence for beliefs or practices differing from or conflicting with one's own"

(Webster).

- "The ability, willingness, or capacity to tolerate something" (Oxford).
- Again, we are blessed with various freedoms (i.e., assembly, speech, and religion).
- However, this does not mean that truth is relative or that it is self-defined.

- The Modern Concept Of Tolerance is Incompatible With Teaching of God Almighty.
 - "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." (Exodus 20:3-6; Deuteronomy 6:13-15; Isaiah 44:6-8).
- It is incompatible with the teaching of the prophets who called upon ancient Israel to choose between the Lord and false idols. (Joshua 24:14-28; I Kings 18:20-40)
- It is incompatible with the teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ, who condemned unscriptural innovations, and affirmed "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father but through ME" (John 14:6; Matthew 7:21-23).
 - It is incompatible with the teaching of the apostles who exhorted Christians to "contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 3; Galatians 1:6-9).

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"Thou shalt have no other gods before me." (Exodus 20:3-6; Deuteronomy
3 "You shall have no other gods before Me. 4 "You shall not make for yourself a carved image—any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth;
5 you shall not bow down to them nor serve them. For I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children to the third and fourth generations of those who hate Me,

and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father but through **ME**" (John 14:6; Matthew 7:21-23).

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13 You shall fear the LORD your God and serve Him, and shall take bove, oaths in His name. 14 You shall not go after other gods, the gods of th; the peoples who are all around you 15 (for the LORD your God is a 'your jealous God among you), lest the anger of the LORD your God be aroused against you and destroy you from the face of the earth.

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Greek word *anecho*, translated "endure" or "bear with" in KJV and "show tolerance" or "tolerate" in the NASB means either "to regard someone or something with tolerance, i.e., *bear with, put up with, tolerate*", or "to undergo something onerous or troublesome without giving in, i.e., *endure*".

This word occurs 15 times in the New Testament and may be grouped in the following categories:

1. Some things are tolerated because they fall within the realm of duty.

- Regarding the charge made by the Jews against Paul, Galilio the deputy of Achaia said, "If it were a matter of wrongdoing or wicked crimes, O Jews, there would be reason why I should <u>bear with</u> you. 15 But if it is a question of words and names and your own law, look to it yourselves; for I do not want to be a judge of such matters." Acts 18:14-15 NKJV
 - "But when Paul was about to open his mouth, Gallio said to the Jews, 'If it were a matter of wrong or of vicious crime, O Jews, it would be reasonable for me to put up with you; I 5 but if there are questions about words and names and your own law, look after it yourselves; I am unwilling to be a judge of these matters." NASB
- It was Galileo's duty to judge criminal wrongdoing; however religious disputes fell outside his civil jurisdiction.
- Faithful Christians willingly "endure" persecutions and afflictions. (I Cor. 4:11-13; 2 Thess. 1:3-5)
- Facing such trials are part and parcel of a Christian's life. (John 15:18-25)

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I I To the present hour we both hunger and thirst, and we are poorly clothed, and beaten, and homeless. I2 And we labor, working with our own hands. Being reviled, we bless; being persecuted, we endure; I3 being defamed, we entreat. We have been made as the filth of the world, the offscouring of all things until now.

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Regarding the charge made by the Jews against Paul, Galilio the deputy of Achaia said "If it were a matter of wrongdoing or wicked crimes O lews there would be 3 We ought always to give thanks to God for you, brethren, as is only fitting, because your faith is greatly enlarged, and the love of each one of you toward one another grows ever greater; 4 therefore, we ourselves speak proudly of you among the churches of God for your perseverance and faith in the midst of all your persecutions and afflictions which you endure. 5 This is a plain indication of God's righteous judgment so that you will be considered worthy of the kingdom of God, for which indeed you are suffering.

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18 "If the world hates you, you know that it has hated Me before it hated you. 19 If you were of the world, the world would love its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, because of this the world hates you. 20 Remember the word that I said to you, 'A slave is not greater than his master.' If they persecuted Me, they will also persecute you; if they kept My word, they will keep yours also. 21 But all these things they will do to you for My name's sake, because they do not know the One who sent Me. 22 If I had not come and spoken to them, they would not have sin, but now they have no excuse for their sin. 23 He who hates Me hates My Father also. 24 If I had not done among them the works which no one else did, they would not have sin; but now they have both seen and hated Me and My Father as well. 25 But they have done this to fulfill the word that is written in their Law, 'They hated Me without a cause.'

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2. Some things are tolerated because they fall within the realm of love.

- Regarding the faithless generation to which He spoke, Jesus said, "O faithless and perverse generation, how long shall I be with you? How long shall I <u>bear</u> with you?" Mt. 17:17 NKJV (Parallel Mk. 9:19; Lk. 9:41)
 - "You unbelieving and perverted generation, how long shall I be with you? How long shall I put up with you?" NASB
- Realizing our own frailty we should be thankful the Lord **bears** with our weaknesses; yet, let us also recognize the limit of His patience. (2 Pet. 3:8-13)
- Christians must also show "tolerance" toward one another in love. (Eph. 4:1-3), "bearing" with one another, and forgiving one another. (Col. 3:12-14)
- We should love one another, as we collectively strive to walk according to His commandments. (John 13:34-35; 2 John 4-6)

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2. Some things are tolerated because they fall within the realm of love.

8 But, beloved, do not forget this one thing, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day. 9 The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some count slackness, but is longsuffering toward us, not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance.'

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8 But, beloved, do not forget this one thing, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day. I. I, therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you to walk worthy of the calling with which you were called, 2 with all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, bearing with one another in love, 3 endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

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- 8 But, beloved, do not forget this one thing, that with the Lord 12 Therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, put on tender mercies, kindness, humility, meekness, longsuffering; 13 bearing with one another, and forgiving one another, if anyone has a complaint against another; even as Christ forgave you, so you also must do. 14 But above all these things put on love, which is the bond of perfection.
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8 But, beloved, do not forget this one thing, that with the Lord 12 Therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, put on 4 I rejoiced greatly that I have found some of your children walking in truth, as we received commandment from the Father. 5 And now I plead with you, lady, not as though I wrote a new commandment to you, but that which we have had from the beginning: that we love one another. 6 This is love, that we walk according to His commandments. This is the commandment, that as you have heard from the beginning, you should walk in it.

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This word occurs 15 times in the New Testament and may be grouped in the following categories:

3. Some things MUST NOT BE tolerated because they fall outside the realm of truth.

- Paul used the term to describe the Corinthian church's toleration of false teachers and their damnable doctrines: "For you put up with fools gladly, since you yourselves are wise! 20 For you put up with it if one brings you into bondage, if one devours you, if one takes from you, if one exalts himself, if one strikes you on the face." 2 Cor. 11:19-20 NKJV
 - "For you, being so wise, tolerate the foolish gladly. 20 For you tolerate it if anyone enslaves you, anyone devours you, anyone takes advantage of you, anyone exalts himself, anyone hits you in the face." NASB
- Christ also criticized the church in Thyatira for tolerating evil within their midst: "Nevertheless I have a few things against you, because you <u>allow</u> that woman Jezebel, who calls herself a prophetess, to teach and seduce My servants to commit sexual immorality and eat things sacrificed to idols.". Rev. 2:20 NKJV ("sufferest", KJV)
 - "But I have this against you, that you <u>tolerate</u> the woman Jezebel, who calls herself a prophetess, and she teaches and leads My bond-servants astray so that they commit acts of immorality and eat things sacrificed to idols." NASB

PLURALISM: TOLERANCE OF ALL BELIEFS

CONCLUSION:

- Disciples of Christ should bear with/be tolerant of one another as we struggle with weaknesses in trying to live faithfully for the Lord.
- Nevertheless, we must not put up with/tolerate sinful behavior or false doctrine; they can neither be accepted or endorsed.
- It all comes down to our attitude toward the truth.
- Human opinions are in a state of constant flux/change; Divine truth never changes! (Psalms 119:89,160; Isaiah 40:6-8; 1 Peter 1:22-25)
- Apostates will not endure/tolerate sound doctrine (2 Tim. 4:1-5), but believers bear with/tolerate the inspired message (Heb. 13:22).
- While disciples of Christ are obligated to show tolerance for one another in love, we must respect the distinctive nature of the Gospel above all (Eph. 4:1-16).

PLURALISM: TOLERANCE OF ALL RELIEFS

22 Since you have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit in sincere love of the brethren, love one another fervently with a pure heart, 23 having been born again, not of corruptible seed but incorruptible, through the word of God which lives and abides forever, 24 because "All flesh is as grass, And all the glory of man as the flower of the grass.The grass withers, And its flower falls away, 25 But the word of the Lord endures forever."

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PLURALISM: TOLEDANCE OF ALL DELLES

I. I charge you therefore before God and the Lord Jesus Christ, who will judge the living and the dead at His appearing and His kingdom: 2 Preach the word! Be ready in season and out of season. Convince, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and teaching. 3 For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine, but according to their own desires, because they have itching ears, they will heap up for themselves teachers; 4 and they will turn their ears away from the truth, and be turned aside to fables. 5 But you be watchful in all things, endure afflictions, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry.

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
