- 10. In the first half of chapter seven we see several statements that seem a bit counterintuitive to the human mind (death/birth, mourning/feasting, sorrow/laughter, rebuke/singing). What possible advantage could there be in these negative times? (v. 13-29)
 - Consider God's purposes. Enjoy the good days, learn from the bad. (v. 13-14)
 - Guard against self-righteousness and wickedness alike. Don't wear your feelings on your sleeve. (v. 15-17, 21-22)
 - Seek wisdom, but realize there are things we will never understand (v. 18-19 & 23-25)
 - The truly upright and righteous will be in the minority. (v. 27-29)

- 11. List a few New Testament passages that would apply and help us find value here?
 - Mt. 5:4... "Blessed are those who mourn"
 - 2 Cor. 7:10... Godly sorrow leads to repentance.
 - Rom. 11:33... God's purposes are unsearchable and unfathomable.
 - Rom. 12:2-3... Humble. Practicing sound judgement.
 - Rom. 12:10-18... Be devoted to brotherly love.

13. What is the message of the first seven verses of chapter twelve?

- In view of the first eleven chapters and the futility of all things "under the sun", Solomon concludes that one should begin in his youth to live with God ever in mind.
- Life will take its toll on the body. Without a godly purpose for it all, the preacher determines that the short life here is utterly meaningless. (v. 8)

"The Conclusion of the Matter..." 11:9-12:14 14. And, of course, what is Solomon's final conclusion?

- After careful consideration, stemming from a desire to discover what truly matters and where the answers can be found to life greatest questions, the Preacher found only one source of meaning and purpose to it all. "Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man."
