• "Song of songs" • "Canticles" from the Latin • Value of the studying the book: Scripture - Beautiful language, just enough. Intimacy does not need to be tawdry, salacious. Stephen called "Implicit, not explicit".

Consider the anticipation of their time together in each passage. b) In 2:14, as she imagines him speaking to her. • Even in separation, she imagines his desire to see her, his voice, and his compliments - "My darling, my beautiful one" (v. 10, 13) - "Let me see your form... it is lovely" - "Let me hear your voice... it is sweet"

• It is obvious throughout that Solomon feels special and privileged because she has maintained her chastity. She is all the more desirable to him as a pure and chaste
