Introduction: God knows how to build up His people

- A. The tragedy of our "educated" society is that in their pride *they deny reality*!
 - 1. God's design is mocked and rejected as harmful.
 - 2. There are predictable fruits. (Jer 2:11-13; Prov 30:11-14)
- B. God richly provides us with "bulwarks" to overcome these false ways. (Isa 26:1-3)
 - 1. How can we build godly men? God reminded David of how He lifted him from
 - being a shepherd to becoming a leader of God's people! (2 Sam 7:8-9)
 - 2. What are the roles of *those in the home and in the church*?

I. Fathers have a crucial role in the training up of their sons.

A. The tragedy of this age is the destruction of the father-son relationship. (Heb 12:7-9)

- 1. Many mothers are <u>never entering marriage or have been divorced</u>. In many communities the vast majority of boys do not live with their dads.
- 2. There are multigeneration families with *no fathers in the home*. (Deut 5:9-10)
- B. There are *unique needs* that a son has in his upbringing.
 - 1. In the beginning he is close and *naturally attached to his mother*. (Prov 29:15)
 - 2. As he grows older, he naturally will <u>seek to grow closer to his father</u> and wants to learn to be a man! (Prov 4:1-5)

II. What are some common characteristics of men?

A. Men are different than women.

- 1. Men's bodies and brains are different as well as *how they thin*k. God made both male and female. **(Gen 1:27)**
- 2. A man has tendencies that can be molded for good and bad. There are <u>severe</u> <u>consequences for those who deny reality</u>.
- B. Some general observations about men.
 - 1. A male's orientation toward life *tends to be outward*. Consider these notes:
- Explorative. Determined to "deliver the goods." Needs to know what's next. Opportunistic. • Takes chances. • Initiator. • Active and aggressive. • Competitive and dominant.
 - 2. These tendencies are not evil but they do need to be brought <u>under the control</u> <u>and guidance of God</u>! (Ps 37:3-5; 34:7-10; Jer 4:3-4)
 - C. In youth, they need to be understood <u>as acting and thinking as a boy</u>.
 - This does not mean accepting bad behavior, but <u>understanding with wisdom</u>. (Deut 6:5-9)
 - 2. Boys *are not evil* because they are aggressive, physical, direct and competitive.
 - 3. Some "experts" want to make boys into girls and <u>make them feel ashamed</u> about their natural God-given abilities.
- D. Boys need to *identify and connect with other men*.

- 1. In their development in their youth then need <u>to be with men</u> and <u>do things that</u> <u>are approved</u> by those they respect. (1 Cor 11:1; Heb 6:12)
- 2. When I grew up *my dad was the best man on earth*. I loved to do things with him and to hear his praise. That respect *is in my spirit today*.

III. Raising sons with God's wisdom

- A. Men are *slower* to develop and learn about relationships.
 - 1. The natural strengths of boys push then towards *achievement and competition*.
 - 2. Learning how to *understand others and develop relationships* is something that they must develop later. (Mk 10:42-45; Prov 5:1-5, 20-23)
- B. Boys can easily be caught up in what I call <u>a "digital dungeon</u>." (2 Pt 2:19)
 - 1. Relationships <u>are complex and often disappointing</u>. Computer games are predictable, stimulating and emotionally rewarding. Porn is a major issue.
 - 2. We must lead them to face and learn the difficult lessons of life. (Deut 4:9-10)
 - 3. Instant gratification in an imaginary digital world *ill prepares our sons for the real world*. Ordinary conversation is impacted by the digital world.
 - 4. Your sons future will be determined by his ability to discern *in forming and keeping the right kind of relationships*. (Prov 13:20-21)

IV. Men need to see and associate with men of true conviction

- A. All men need "heroes." Consider *the men God places* as a "cloud of witnesses" before us! (Heb 12:1; 11:32-35)
 - 1. Where do we find our personal heroes? It begins with <u>men and women that have</u> <u>taken a personal interest in us</u> and have built us up. (1 Tim 1:5-7)
 - 2. <u>Who</u> did Timothy look up to? (2 Tim 3:10, 14-15)
- B. Men need to *build their abilities to discern*. (Heb 5:12-14; Acts 20:31)
 - 1. Specific, detailed preaching is very needed.
 - 2. Men need to see conflict and leadership in action.

V. Local churches and the development of male leadership

- A. The plain exposing of deceit combined with the challenge *to change and fight with a purpose* appeals to the real needs of men! (Mt 3:7-10; Acts 24:16, 24-25)
 - 1. Shepherds *can build* an "atmosphere of trust and of open hearts."
 - 2. This takes *planting, watering and weeding*. It involves both a building up and a tearing down. (Titus 1:10-11; 1 Pt 5:2-4)
 - 3. Leadership will duplicate itself in what is both good and bad!
- B. When churches become ashamed of these powerful demands, *they become weak*, *inconsistent and hypocritical*.
 - 1. When members refuse to work out problems as God's word directs, then *they must be confronted*. (Mt 18:15-17; Titus 3:10-11)
 - 2. Repentance must be demanded and there *must be a purging of that leaven*!
- C. When you build on a foundation of repentance then *true change always restores relationship and trust*. We major in forgiveness! (Eph 4:31-32)
